AS WE GATHER

"From Living among the Tomb to Living after the Tomb." A man living in the country of the Gerasenes had a demon. This demonic possession drove the man to leave the city, and to not live in a house, but rather to live among the tombs. The demon, as in other cases of demon possession, knew exactly who Jesus was - namely, the Son of the Most High God. After Jesus exorcised the legion of demons from the man, the man was in his right mind. However, this new lease on life, this new gift of health, came at a cost – the self-destruction of a herd of pigs. The demonic leads people to self-harm. The demonic leads churches to self-harm. Only the Son of the Most High God is able to exorcize the demonic spirits from individuals, or from the church. The listener will discover that the church today is still completely dependent on the Son of the Most High God as the salvation he, and he alone provides to our sinful souls. The congregants will be called to pray that our sins will be placed on something else beside our own selves. The parishioners will be invited to rejoice that God has placed the guilt of our many sins not upon ourselves, and not upon a herd of pigs, but upon the son of the Most High God, in our stead and for our sake without any worthiness or merit in us. New Worship Service Times Our traditional or early worship will start at 8:30 am, then we will have an Education Hour beginning at 9:30 am, with Pastor Krengel leading a Bible Study in the Life Center and Sunday School (when it is back in the fall) start time will be at 9:30 am as well. Our Praise Worship service starts at 10:45 am. Family Worship will be on Wednesday evenings at 6:00 pm; the pattern of informal, casual, worship we have enjoyed for the last few Midweek Evening Worship services in Advent and Lent. 
ECDC NEWS




June 15, 2025 offerings and donations: Offering Envelopes: \$4,553.00; Year to date: \$162,955.00





On the Alleluia Before the Gospel: From the earliest days of the church, Christians have sung the Alleluia before the Gospel reading. Another ancient tradition is for the Alleluia to fall silent during Lent, to mark the penitential nature of the season and to acknowledge that, this side of heaven, "by Babylon's sad waters mourning exiles now are we? (Alleluia, Song of Gladness, LSB 417). Interestingly, Martin Luther opposed the practice of omitting the Alleluia during Lent: "For the Alleluia is the perpetual voice of the church, just as the memorial of His passion and victory is perpetual" (LWE 53:24).
